

2007-2008 EXTRA-STANDARD DUTY

Extra-standard duty is defined to be an assignment given to an employee in addition to and different from the tasks performed by that person in his/her normal duty assignment for which the Lincoln Public Schools agrees to pay a stipend. Informally, it may be thought of as a “change of hats” from one role to another. These job descriptions are to be the minimum expectation.

Three kinds of time are involved in extra-standard assignments — teaching, judging or refereeing, and supervision. A job description is written for each extra-standard assignment identifying the time spent in these three activities. A ratio of 4 to 2 to 1 is used between teaching, judging and supervision time.

TEACHING TIME is time spent in activities demanding expertise in knowledge of skills and strategies and in situations which demand judgments and decisions which affect a final outcome.

JUDGING AND/OR REFEREEING TIME is time spent in evaluating or officiating competitive performances.

SUPERVISION TIME is time spent with teams and groups in activities which involve no teaching, judging, or refereeing.

In addition to the type of job being performed, it is important when the duty must be performed. Prime time is time spent during non-contract days or time spent after the “normal” dinner hour (6:00 p.m.) on contract days. Duties that occur during prime time receive one and one-half times the rate for those occurring at “regular” times (6, 3, 1½).

Consideration is given to extra stress put on the employee because of public interest and concern related to the public performances associated with certain assignments. Public performances are high school varsity athletic activities held on a repeated basis during the calendar of that activity as opposed to a “one time” only performance. The pressure points are assigned each year to the head coach only based on the average or typical attendance at the home school performances during the previous regular scheduled season according to the following scale:

100	—	350	attendance	—	50	points

In addition, sponsors will receive an additional stipend (based upon additional time spent) for teams qualifying for state and national competition.

PLEASE NOTE

When students of the Lincoln Public Schools qualify for a national contest in an activity listed in policy 6700 of the Lincoln Public Schools Manual of Policies and Regulations and when the Associate Superintendent for Instruction approves student participation in a national contest, the sponsor/coach of the students participating shall be paid a stipend in accordance with the guidelines used by the Extra Standard Salary Committee concerning such activities.

Sponsors of students who are asked to perform or otherwise participate without a qualifying process must seek prior approval from the Associate Superintendent of Instruction before participating in the event or requesting compensation for participating in the event.

PRINCIPAL'S UNDEFINED POINTS

Extra Standard generic points — Extra Standard Pay Committee regulations:

1. Points must be used to support an activity or club for students. However, increasing time/salary for an activity listed on the extra standard list is not allowed.
2. Each hour of teacher involvement is equal to three (3) points; each point is valued at \$4.36. The minimum expenditure for one activity is nine (9) hours or 27 points.
3. Certified staff members must have the first opportunity for activity and club sponsorship prior to offering payment to classified staff members or non-district employees.
